

Interview with DTM Don



Don Prades DTM Founding Member,

What would your advice be to members aspiring to become DTM?

My advice is twofold. First be organized. Experience tells us that the more organized we are in our lives, the more successful we become. Second, set a goal for yourself and work on it one speech at time. If you have no goal, you will not accomplish anything. Remember, the benefits you get from the Toastmasters are commensurate to the efforts you put into the Toastmasters. If you give less, that's what you get, less. If you give more, then you get more. If you give nothing, that's what you getnothing! In the end the individual member is the architect of his own future in the Toastmasters.



Briefly tell us about your HPL project.

First of all, HPL means High Performance Leadership program. This is a prerequisite before one gets an ALS and a DTM. The duration is three to six months. It took me six months to finish it. The central idea of my HPL project is to make Active Minds the model club of all Kuwait Toastmasters clubs through improved club meetings by the end of 2012. This can be achieved by making each club member accountable for the sustained improvement of our meetings by implementing our club core values and TMI's DCP (Distinguished Club Programs). All the required points should be achieved by December 31.

You are a DTM now, what next?

Most of the DTMs that I know have repeated the process they went through in achieving DTM. Some of them have repeated it five times or even more. I don't want to repeat the process but I want to deliver at least one DTAC caliber speech and one major workshop a year. Some of the workshops that I want to give are the following:

- Parliamentary Procedure in Action.
- How to Conduct Productive Meetings.
- Speech Craft.
- Youth Leadership Program (YLP)
- Etc...etc....etc...

Name the advanced manuals you used to achieve ACB, ACS and ACG.

There are at least 16 Advanced Manuals to choose from. I chose the manuals that I was interested in and that I could easily relate to like:

- 1. Specialty Speeches (5).
- 2. The Professional Speaker (5)
- 3. Story Telling (5)
- 4. Interpretive Reading (5)
- 5. Persuasive Speaking (5)
- Special Occasion Speeches
 (5)
- (Total of 30 Speeches altogether)

Distinguished Toastmaster (DTM)

The Distinguished Toastmaster award is the highest our organization bestows and it recognizes both communication and leadership skills. To be eligible for the award a member must have:

- 1. Achieved Advanced Communicator Gold award
- 2. Achieved Advanced Leader Silver award

WHAT'S YOUR EDUCATIONAL GOAL THIS YEAR?

sk any person who has achieved something worthwhile whether they just 'happened' to achieve it 'by chance' and they are almost certain to tell you that they achieved it because they started with a goal in mind...

As a Toastmaster, what's your educational goal this year? Do you plan to complete an educational award from either the Communication or Leadership Tracks of the Toastmasters Educational Program? If yes, bravo! If no, why not?

While attending Toastmasters meetings and watching others give speeches does teach you something, the ones who get up on stage and deliver speeches regularly are the ones who are not only learning the most, they are also the ones who are really growing into able communicators and leaders.

As VP-Education, I am responsible this year to help members of our club set and achieve their goals over the next 12 months. If you want to improve your ability to listen and observe, ensure that you sign up to be a Grammarian/Ah-Counter, General Evaluator or a Speech Evaluator on a regular basis. Looking to hone your time management skills? Take up the role of a Table Topics Master or if you really want a challenge, volunteer to be the Toastmaster of the Meeting a couple of times during the year.

If your goal is to learn how to write a good speech and deliver it with appropriate gestures and vocal variety, working through the first 6 projects of the Competent Communication manual will get you there. If you've completed 6 speeches already, how about stretching yourself to complete the Competent Communication manual? If you've done that, it is a good idea to take your speaking skills to the next level by aiming to deliver at least one speech from an Advanced Communication Manual every alternate month, while taking up roles in between.

As I mentioned earlier, the ones who deliver speeches regularly are the ones who are likely to grow the most because they will constantly be working on writing, polishing and practicing their speeches.

Personally, I have set myself a 'stretch' goal of completing at least 6 Advanced Speeches before 30th June 2013. That's one speech every two months. My second goal is to learn how to use Visual Aids.

If you have a goal or need help setting one, talk to me (and/ or your mentor) and we can chart out a course in advance, which you can then work on achieving during the next few months. Even if you have been in Toastmasters for a year or two, approach a more experienced member and request them to be your mentor, so that you are 'accountable' to someone for your progress and can seek guidance when you seem to get 'stuck' sometimes.

Don't wait till next month. Grab a sheet of paper NOW, write down the skills you want to develop, the number of speeches you plan to deliver (and at which meeting), hand a copy to your mentor and the VPE, work that plan down to the last letter...and then watch the transformation that takes place... in YOU.

How Toastmasters Works

At Toastmasters, members learn by speaking to groups and working with others in a supportive environment. A typical toastmasters club is made up of 20 to 30 people who meet once a week for approximately an hour. Each meeting gives everyone an opportunity to practice:

- <u>Conducting meetings.</u> Members learn how to plan and conduct meetings.
- **Giving impromptu speeches.** Members present one- to two minute, impromptu speeches on assigned topics.
- <u>Presenting prepared speeches.</u> Two or more members present speeches based on projects from manuals in Toastmasters' proven communication and/or leadership programs. Projects cover topics such as speech organization, vocal variety, language, gestures and persuasion.
- <u>Offering constructive evaluation</u>. Every prepared speaker is assigned an evaluator who points out speech strengths and offers suggestions for improvement.

Turning tables on Table Topics at DTAC 2012

re you afraid of impromptu speaking? Are you dumbfounded when posed with a question you have no idea about? Are you eager to learn ways to combat this? Then you are reading this article, just as I did three months ago.

The reason why I joined Toastmasters was to improve my impromptu skills, which was my biggest fear. In life, sometimes, our weakness can be our undefeatable strength. All it takes to turn tables is the first step, perseverance and practice. This same principle applies to turning tables on table topics itself.

In order to succeed in tackling table topics, there are a few proven tricks that must be mastered and implemented in various ways. From my experience, I have come across few of them:

Pay close attention to everything around you, current, local, international and historical events. People tend to gravitate towards others that have something to contribute in a regular conversation.

- Pay close attention to people around you; their experiences, adventures, stories, emotions are surplus gear for you to revamp your own experiences to tackle any type of impromptu situation.
- 2. If you are not in the habit of reading, then table topics will get you started. The more you read, the more chances are that you will improve your vocabulary, pickup on catchy phrases and memorizing quotations. The latter is vital as it adds

an extra punch line when you use them, at any given point in your speech. Quotations, if used aptly, can do most of the talking. But do remember to quote them correctly to give due credit to the originator.

- 3. Apply the above three techniques consistently so that you program yourself, like they say, you must eat, sleep and live table topics.
- Practice, practice and practice. Apply your knowledge; visualize yourself in situations wherein you have to give an impromptu speech. Another aspect is timing your responses. It does not matter if you are participating in a contest or not, by limiting your responses within a time constraint, you train yourself to respond quickly to otherwise uneasy situations.
- 5. Apply the fundamental principle that will guarantee your success which is "Listen, Confirm, Pause, Tell and End". This principle I learnt at the "Impromptu Speaking" workshop conducted by DTM Don Prades. Toastmasters provide a variety of workshops throughout the year and offer trainings by the pro's themselves.

The above techniques contributed to my success in winning the Club, Area and Division contests. Every time, I won each of these contests, it was just the beginning of my journey to greater heights. I had the same focus, perspective and attitude while I prepared for the most coveted District Trophy at the District Toastmasters Annual Conference (DTAC).

My experience at DTAC was indeed an enlightening one. It is a much awaited event wherein you meet talented Toastmasters from diverse backgrounds across the Middle East; Toastmasters who share the same passion, mission and vision. Truly, I felt a deep sense of belonging. But my mission in attending DTAC-2012 was two-fold; one was to experience all of its goodness and second was to represent Kuwait (Division I) and participate in the table topics contest. For a beginner like me with only six months into Toastmasters, participating in the District Contest was extremely demanding. I carried on my shoulders heavy expectations imposed by myself, family, friends and fellow Toastmasters. As much support I received from them, nothing could prepare me for DTAC because I had no clue what to expect.

Over the 3 day DTAC conference, I got to witness colorful Club banner marches, partake in the delicious Gavel dinner ceremony, attend thought-provoking workshops and training sessions from veterans and enjoy the sincere and sweet camaraderie of fellow toastmasters. The icing on the cake was bearing witness to the very talented and eloquent candidates who participated in the Table Topics, Humorous, Speech Evaluation and International Speech contests. Those candidates displayed a variety of attributes such as speech delivery techniques, style, structure

and their overall approach in communication, some of which I use in my everyday experiences.


On the first day of the event, was the semi-finals, a total of 12 candidates competed in two batches of 6. I was a nervouswreck on the day of, yet I stayed cool, calm and composed. As in all contests, we were briefed of the rules and ushered into the "quarantine" area. When my turn came, I gave it my best shot. As always, after I took my seat, I recollected on what I could have done better and it was to curb my nervousness, after all it was a new ballgame for me. Nevertheless, I did make it to the finals. My joy knew no bounds and I could not contain it. My fellow toastmasters briefed me on some pointers and gave me a head's up on my competitors. The next 24 hours and counting to the finals

would be the most grueling hours of my life. As I prepared for the finals, I thought to myself that 3 whole months of "living on the edge" had finally come to the moment, the moment of truth, the "curtain call". After the usual ritual of briefing et al, I waited my turn. I was determined to try a different approach and at my turn, I did give it my best shot. But it was not enough. On the third and final day of the event, were the award ceremonies. As I sat in the company of my fellow Toastmasters, the results were announced; of the 6 finalists, only 3 candidates made the cut and I was not part of those elite trios. Under the weight of crushed expectations, I sank in my seat, trying to recollect my thoughts of what went wrong. But, I got a hold of myself, and when I did, I was happy

that I did lose in style to the crème of the crop.

Today, I take pride and hold my head high, because I have achieved something that will always remain a feather in my hat. And in the end, it does not matter if you win or lose, because it is the quitters that never win and the winners never quit. All that matters is to keep preserving and use all that you learn at Toastmasters to transform your attitude, thinking and perspective. This is truly a platform where leaders are made!
